BETA ALUMNI ASSOCIATION IN ALABAMA

The Brothers of Delta Theta Chapter in trying to improve alumni relations have resolved to establish an active Alabama Alumni Association. We feel that there has been a communication gap between the alumni and the active chapter which is mainly due to the lack of communications on the chapter's part. 

We realize that this Alumni Association appears to be centered around the University Chapter, but by using Delta Theta as a starting point this association will be able to expand to benefit the Delta Zeta chapter at Auburn and any future chapters that may be established at other schools in the state.

It is not very difficult to imagine the possibilities and advantages of having such an association. The purpose of the association would be to act as a link between the alumni and his social fraternity. In the past in this state the tendency has been to consider the alumni as simply gone and out of the picture. This is the problem we believe that such an association could alleviate. The first step in organizing the association will be made during the Christmas Holidays. Each active member of Delta Theta will attempt to contact the Betas in his area of the state. The purpose of these personal contacts is to discuss the possibility of forming the proposed organization and to see if there is a desire for it. The next step will depend on the results of our contacts. If we find that it will be possible to establish local chapters of a Beta Theta Pi Alumni Association in Alabama then the second step would be to have a state-wide meeting of Betas. This meeting will be used to set the foundation for what is hoped to be a long lasting organization.

We realize that the majority of Betas in Alabama hold allegiance to their Alma Mater, but we firmly believe that there is a bond that holds all Betas together and that there will develop a great interest in the Beta chapters in Alabama. An Editorial . . .

What is a fraternity? Some people say it is only a group of men, but most will agree that this is incomplete. Others say a fraternity is no more than a boarding house, an athletic club, or a place to bring dates. If it is such a difficult task to define a fraternity, one might wonder whether there is a justification for the existence of fraternities. Another definition is that a fraternity is a group of men plus the ties that bind them. Now the obvious question is, what are these ties and how are they developed. To begin with, they are not tangible qualities and this makes the task of defining them more difficult. Paul P. Van Riper, De Pauw '38, was touching on this matter in his address to Delta Theta at our installation banquet on January 9, 1965 when he said, "from fraternal life, more than any other educational device there is to be gained the type of organizational and personal experience so crucially necessary for the survival and prosperity of a way of life based not only on freedom but also on cooperation and responsibility." Although one does not lose his individuality, emphasis is placed upon the idea of mutual assistance. The word, "fraternity," comes from Latin and French derivations which means friendship, comradeship, and love in the spiritual sense. This is the quality that will make or break a fraternity.

Beta Theta Pi was founded on this principle in 1839. This nation has been involved in three great wars since that time and many things have changed but the need for the friendship and brotherhood that our fraternity was based on still exists and probably always will. In answer to the question of how Beta Theta Pi has been able to accomplish so much since their founding, Dr. Seth R. Brooks, former President of Beta Theta Pi, has said "we have no secret weapon, no startling new ideals, and no methods of proceeding not available to others. Rather the secret lies in our willingness to live our lives and conduct our affairs more in terms of the principles upon which we have been founded than many others are willing or able to do."

A fraternity affects all aspects of the lives of its members while they are in college. But if only one aspect had to be chosen as the most important, it would be the ideal of mutual assistance among men. If our chapter, Delta Theta of Beta Theta Pi, is able to teach only one lesson to its members, let it be this principle: If men would assist rather than resist each other, this would be a better world in which to live. If a fraternity can impress upon its members the idea of cooperation among men, this fact alone would justify its existence.
